

#### **Kinship Outreach & Support Services**

- **Grandparent & Close Relative Caregiver Program** helps low-income District residents who are raising their kin children. Those who qualify may receive money every month to help care for children living with them.
- **Kinship Navigator Program** enhances the community and caregiver capacity to keep children safe and well in the homes of their relatives.

#### **Entries and Re-entries Summary**

- 240 Entries or Re-entries (238 kids)
- 227 children/youth (95%) stayed in care at least 8 days
- 55 (24%) experienced a kin placement





## Barriers to Emergency Kin Licensing

- Clinical Concerns: Untreated MH- Inability to set boundaries with parents/guardians-Vacillation in commitment to licensing-Criminal/CPS history
- **Unwilling/Unable:** Kin refusing to engage with kinship licensing team and/or CFSA. Self reported age, illness, or lifestyle making it difficult to care for children.





## Barriers to Emergency Kin Licensing

- Child's Behavior: When children are
  emotionally dysregulated, families have often attempted to support
  the child prior to CFSA involvement. Unsafe behaviors such as,
  criminal activity, suicidal ideation or attempts, aggression toward
  parents/caregivers or household members, involvement in
  community violence or gangs, and sexually acting out behaviors are
  all reasons families feel disease when considering caring for a child.
- Parents Behavior: When parents are emotionally dysregulated, families are often unwilling to care for their children. Dysregulated mood, verbal and physical aggression, family history of unresolved issues, active substance abuse and threatening behaviors are all reasons families have sited in their decision to not move forward with licensing





#### 90 days to Kin!

Kinship's effort to identify, locate and engage kin for licensing or lifelong support and to address any related barriers




## Kiley's Story

- Female child under the age of two
- Lives in a two-parent household; both parents are in their early 20s
- No prior history with CFSA
- Allegation: Unexplained physical injuries

#### Kinship Licensing Process

CFSA's Diligent Search Unit supports KFL identifying kin

Telephonic efforts begin with potential kin providers

Social Worker completes phone assessments with viable kin

Completion of lead inspection (ages 0-6 for D.C. homes)

Conduct home assessment

Utilize the Agency's resources to provide beddings as required by jurisdiction, and other essential items to support the placement.

Upon placement, the licensing team is assigned to the family to assess and support during the 150 day licensing period

### Kiley's Kinship Journey

Official separation → Kinship licensing efforts began → Kin identified and licensed → Kiley had a smooth transition to her maternal grandmother's home





#### Family Team Meeting (FTM)

 An FTM is a structured planning and decisionmaking meeting that uses skilled and trained facilitators to engage families, family supports, and professional partners in creating plans for children's safety, well-being and in laying the groundwork for permanency.



#### **FTM Core Values**



All Families have Strengths.



Families are the experts on themselves.



With appropriate support, families can make informed choices and good decisions about how to keep their children safe.



Teamwork is the best way to make creative, high-quality decisions about complex, multidisciplinary issues.



Families deserve to be treated with dignity and respect.



Children are more likely to achieve long lasting, positive outcomes when their family is involved in decision- making.





### Parent Engagement Education and Resource (PEER)

#### Provide

one-on-one orientation for parents experiencing separation

#### Accompany

CFSA staff and parents during key meetings or interventions

#### Lead

consultations on engagement to Permanency Supervisors and Social Workers

#### **Participate**

in team meetings to address the needs of birth parents and families

#### **Facilitate**

parent support groups focusing on topics such as fatherhood, co-parenting, addiction, and coping with mental health challenges


#### Parents Talk

 Parents Talk is a bi-weekly educational support group for birth parents involved with CFSA.




#### Dads Acknowledging Dads (D.A.D.)
