


Goals of the Program

- ***** EMS









Engineering

- Provide officers with agency contacts for issues to be resolved

Education


- Encourage officers to educate the public during these details

Enforcement

Training

- Officers who participate must fully understand the goals of the detail
- The goal of any pedestrian enforcement program is to save lives and prevent injuries
- Officers who conduct the enforcement must be aware of what constitutes a violation

- High Incident Areas (HIA)









Elements of the offense








Keys to Successful Prosecution

 - Impaired driving










Crosswalk Enforcement Operations


- Mid-block crossing
- Proper signage
- Clear visible crosswalk
- Speed limit 35 or less
- Clear sight lines
- Decoy in bright clothing



Enforcement Teams

- 4-8 Officers
- A supervisor
- All must be trained
- Highly motivated
- Radar/Lidar operations





Pedestrian Enforcement

- Right-of-way violation
- Failure to obey pedestrian signals
- Crossing intersections diagonally
