# Featured Programs & Initiatives



COG's Commuter Connections program marked 50 years of helping commuters find smarter ways to get to work while reducing traffic and air pollution. Area officials, including DC Mayor Muriel Bowser, gathered at the National Press Club to celebrate the anniversary and preview new incentive programs like CommuterCash.

#### **Tree Canopy Goal**

The COG Board of Directors adopted a first-ever tree canopy goal to maintain a minimum tree canopy coverage of 50 percent across the region. The board also called on local jurisdictions to use COG's report, Conserving Trees and Forests in Metropolitan Washington, as a resource supporting this work.





The development of the Visualize 2050 plan continued to progress. The Transportation Planning Board at COG held a public comment period and approved project inputs for its Air Quality Conformity Analysis. Transportation projects must be included in Visualize 2050 to receive federal funding and approvals.

### **DMVMoves Initiative**

Following the successful coordination to address Metro's FY 2025 budget, area officials called for a more comprehensive effort to focus on long-term transit needs and the longstanding, systemic funding challenges facing Metro and the region's other transit systems. As a first step, the COG and Metro Boards of Directors held a historic joint meeting in May and agreed to partner on a new initiative, DMV*Moves*, to create a unified vision and sustainable funding model for the region's transit network.

A task force of officials appointed by COG and Metro are guiding this initiative alongside two advisory groups representing area jurisdictions, transit service providers and agencies, and business, labor, and community organizations. This unprecedented collaboration is taking a holistic view of the transit network (which includes more than a dozen bus and rail systems) and working to forge consensus on how to best plan, coordinate, deliver, manage, and fund transit regionally. The task force is working toward developing policy recommendations and a final plan in 2025.





## Summit

**Roadway Safety** 

The Transportation Planning Board convened a summit to help mobilize new action to improve roadway safety, including plans for the TPB to join the new USDOT Allies in Action initiative, enhance data analysis, and partner regionally to ensure that dangerous drivers are held accountable for their actions.

#### **Anacostia Watershed Cleanup**

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration awarded COG a grant of approximately \$1 million for a new project to remove an estimated 60,000 pounds of large debris and 33 abandoned or derelict vessels from marinas along the river, in collaboration with the Anacostia Riverkeeper. COG helped convene emergency exercises focused on coordinating across multiple agencies on a variety of topics, including cybersecurity and protecting critical infrastructure. COG also organized a Fire Health & Safety Symposium, sharing valuable, life-saving information for the region's firefighters.

### **Water Supply Planning**

After a stretch of unusually dry conditions in the region, COG declared a Drought Watch this summer in coordination with the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin (ICPRB), local water utilities, and federal and regional partners. Officials encouraged the public to take voluntary measures to conserve water and help reduce demand on the region's water supply systems. The Drought Watch, which remained in effect through the end of 2024, was shared widely by COG member governments and partner agencies and earned widespread media coverage.

In partnership with ICPRB, COG also helped unveil a new report highlighting the significant and dire financial consequences facing the DC region in the event of a disruption to the area's water supply. The ICPRB report showed economic losses could quickly surpass \$15 billion in gross regional product, among other impacts. The report and drought underscored the importance of the new backup water source study that COG and partners kicked off with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to ensure greater water supply resiliency.





COG received a \$3.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development to help improve access to affordable housing in the region. The grant will help COG and nine area jurisdictions accelerate implementation of the Regional Fair Housing Plan.





### **EV Charging Infrastructure**

The Federal Highway
Administration awarded \$3.9 million
to COG to support the installation
of electric vehicle (EV) charging
infrastructure across the region. In
addition, COG finalized a Regional
Electric Vehicle Infrastructure
Implementation Strategy to help
advance the region's ongoing
initiatives to expand EV use.

### **Public Safety Coordination**

COG partnered with the Board of Trade, Greater Washington Partnership, and Consortium of Universities to reconvene the Potomac Conference and bring together government, business, and university leaders to more holistically address regional issues. The focus of the 2024 conference was public safety—providing a forum for area leaders to discuss and collaborate on crime reduction initiatives.

The event included briefings on recent trends, initiatives, and the public perception of crime in the region. Officials noted that even when rates are relatively low, the perception of crime shapes everything from how safe residents feel in their communities to how CEOs make business decisions. While 2023 saw a spike in violent crime in the region, 2024 trends significantly improved. In support of greater collaboration, COG has also been working with area police departments to develop a regional, real-time crime dashboard, a much-needed resource that will be launched in early 2025.
