

Reduction in Force: Impacts to Date

- Three scenarios of reduction:
 - Probationary employees
 - Buyouts
 - Formal reductions in force
- "Upon expiration of the Day 1 hiring freeze and implementation of the hiring plan, agencies will be able to hire no more than one employee for every four employees that depart from federal service"



Bracing for Budgetary Impacts

- <u>Maryland</u>: Senate President Bill Ferguson said the state could need to make as much as \$1.5 billion in additional spending cuts beyond the \$2 billion in cuts proposed by Governor Moore. (Washington Post, February 7) More recently, \$280 million has been cut from the state's revenue projections. (Maryland Matters, March 7)
- <u>Virginia</u>: House of Delegates established an Emergency Committee on the Impacts of Federal Workforce and Funding Reductions. Senate has also established an emergency committee.
- <u>DC</u>: Chief Financial Officer Glen Lee has projected that D.C. could lose 40,000 federal jobs over the next several years a reduction of 21 percent. In turn, Lee has revised revenue projections downward by an average of \$342 million annually over the next three years totaling more than \$1 billion. (Washington Post, March 3)



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
