The Planning Directors Technical Advisory Committee has selected 145 Regional Activity Centers (RACs) for the Round 1.0.0 Cooperative Forecast. This memo documents the process for final approval of the new Regional Activity Centers. A copy of the new map is attached.

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The National Capital Region Transportation Planning Board (IPB) Inst called for the creation of a map of Regional Achity Centers in 2000, as a total to better coordinate land use and transportation planning. At the direction of the COG Board the Planning Directors worked to develop the framework of designating community level geographic areas within the COG and TEP planning area as Regional Activity Centers. The first set of RACs was adopted by COG board in 2002 and updated in 2007. In 2012 the RACs were formally included as a key element of COG's Region Forward planning framework. The RACs have been widely used by COG member-jurisdictions as the focus for future regional growth since its adoption. Planning activities both at COG and the PIB have also used RACs, including in COG's work on regional Housing Targets (2019), the competitive Housing Affordability Planning Program (HPPP) creatrs (2011), and the TPB in its various technical assistance grants, including Transportation and Land use Connections (2007) and Transportation Alternative Program (2013).

Given that RACs are grounded in current and forecast growth (in population, employment and land use density), in appriving the current map of Regional Activity Centers in January 2013, the COG Board and the 1PEI also approved Resolution R13-92, which requires COG to review and amend (as needed) the Regional Activity Centers mays following the adoption of each new major round of the Copperative Forecasts. The existing RACs map is based upon the Nound 8.0 Copperative Forecast and was adopted by the COG Board in January 2013. Table 1 (below) shows the history of all versions of the Regional Activity Centers maps. The current update is based upon the Round 1.0.0 Cooperative Forecast of population, households, and employment, which the COG Board adopted in June of 2022; upon the anticipated approval by the Board this year, it will become the fourth official version of the Regional Activity Centers map.

Eligibility Criteria for Regional Activity Center Designation

This update of the Regional Activity Center map began with the Planning Directors Technical Advisory Committee's (PDTA) review of the CoR Board-approved criteria for designating RRAS during the January 2024 PDTAC meeting. The Committee decided that no changes to the Board-approved methodology would be proposed at this time and advised COS staff in the Department of Community Planning and Technical Services (DCPS) to begin the analysis using Round 10.0 data and the adorest methodology would be committed.

The adopted methodology calls for any geographic area to meet the following two core attributes plus any two of the four secondary attributes:

- Policy Core Attribute The center or priority growth area should be designated in a jurisdiction's adopted comprehensive (general plan or other locally adopted land use plan.)
- Density Core Attribute In the Round 10.0 Cooperative Forecast, the potential RAC must have a persons per acre density (employment + population) that falls within the top one-half of densities within the jurisdiction in the 2050 forecast year.

In addition, the potential RAC must also fulfill at least two of the following four secondary attributes:

- 1. Intersection Density Additional Attribute Have at least 55 intersections per square mile.
- Transit Capacity Additional Attribute Have an existing high-capacity/performance transit (e.g. Metrorail, BRT, commuter rail, OR light rail), or have planned station with dedicated local funding or that is identified in the constrained element of Visualize 2045
- Land Use Mix Additional Attribute Have a locally adopted land use plan/ordinance that encourages mixed-use development (e.g. through a mixed-use designation, form-based code, or questions).
- codes, or overlay zoning)

 4. Housing and Transportation Affordability Additional Attribute Combined housing and transportation costs within the potential RAC do not exceed 45% of regional median income, as measured by the Center for Neighborhood Technology's H+T Index.

Analysis and Selection of Round 10.0 Regional Activity Centers

COG staff worked collaboratively with member-jurisdiction planning department staff in 2024 to select Regional Activity Centers for Round 1.0.0. As with the 2013 map, each new Regional Activity Center is represented conceptually by a circle with a radius of a half-mile. While the half-mile circles portray the location of the RACs at a regional cashe, COG staff worked closely with each local planning department to define the actual geographic areas for each RAC through a synthesis of local

planning data and maps. The geographic area used corresponds to the transportation analysis zones (TAZs) defined in the TPB's travel demand model to retain the founding aim of the linkage between transportation and land use.

Listed below in alphabetical order, Table 2, and seen in the attached map are all the geographic areas in the COS region determined to meet RAC criteria in the Round 10.0 Cooperative Forecasts. As can be seen in the accompanying map, the official numbering for the RACS follows the longstanding TFB policy for analytical geographies that begins in the core of the District, then roughly proceeds clockwise into the Maryland and Northern Virgina jurisdictions.

Round 10.0 Regional Activity Center Analysis Framework and Approval Process

Throughout the process, COG staff provided the PDTAC with monthly updates and solicited input on the selection progress:

- Q4 2023: presented a proposed schedule for development of the Round 10.0 Regional Activity Centers map to the PDTAC
- Q1 and Q2 2024: examined adopted local comprehensive/general plans and small area plans to identify the latest center or priority growth areas.
- Q2 and Q3 2024: met one-on-one with member-jurisdiction planning staff to select the
 appropriate geographies upon which to apply the adopted methodology.
- Q3 2024: analyzed planning areas around the region using the approved eligibility criteria.
- Q3 and Q4 2024: presented eligible Regional Activity Centers to member-jurisdiction
 planning staff in one-or-ore meetings. Jurisdiction staff provided feedback on atternative
 geographies on names for potential RACs, and on the suitability of cross-jurisdictional RAC
 boundaries. When appropriate, COG staff re-analyzed areas to see if requested geographies
 met the eligibility criteria.
- Q4 2024 and Q1 2025: COG staff transmitted memoranda to each member-jurisdiction identifying the selected Round 1.0.0 Regional Activity Centers, including maps showing the location and boundaries of each.

The Planning Directors are scheduled to approve the new Round 10.0 Activity Centers map during the March 21 meeting, after which the COG Board is expected to review and approve the draft map.






Regional Activity Centers Map based on the COG Round 10.0 Cooperative Forecast Draft for PDTAC, March 21, 2025
