Residents at Risk of Food Insecurity

1.05 million people in Montgomery County 403k people (almost 4 in 10 individuals) live in households with incomes below 400% of the federal poverty level (FPL) 323k people live below the Self Sufficiency Standard 169k people (1 in 6 indiv.) live in households with incomes below 185% of the FPL (FARMs Threshold) 116k people (1 in 10 indiv.) live in households with incomes below 130% the FPL (SNAP Threshold)

Mission: To develop and implement interagency budgetary, regulatory, and operational strategies to build a more equitable, efficient, resilient, and sustainable food system in Montgomery County.

Resilience: The capability of individuals, communities, and the County to withstand and rapidly recover from food system disruptions, stresses, and changes.



Diversified Assistance Strategies and Partnerships

Strengthening Local Food Production

Farm to Foodbank Program: \$573,000 invested in FY25

- food purchased from 31 County Farms distributed through 68+ Food Assistance Provider partners
- **Community Farm Share:** \$140,000 in purchases from local farms

<u>Collaborative Funding</u> Partnership with Manna Food Center

• \$133,431 awarded to 10 Montgomery County-based farms for equipment and infrastructure investments, as loans that are "repaid" with food contributed to the County food assistance network

Resident & Community Gardening Grant Program: \$200,000 to 7 organizations in FY24

MCPS REACH Hub: Supports K-12 agriculture and education (operated by CKC Farming)

Food as Medicine Grant Program

Overview

- Supports innovative programs that increase access to culturally diverse, medicallyrelevant, nutritious, & locally produced food for families facing food insecurity
- Grantees are qualified healthcare provider organizations that offer pediatric primary care services to underserved populations in Montgomery County

First launched April 2024, 9-month grant period

Award Summary:

- Collaborative partnerships between pediatric primary care services and food assistance providers- 10 sites supported by 5 grantees
 - 2 Hospital Systems, 1 Healthcare Clinic
 - 2 Food Assistance Providers
 - 4 School-Based Health Centers
- Total awarded: \$449,337
- 98% of food purchased sourced locally



School-Based Food Assistance Grants

FY25 Award Summary:

- Total dollars awarded: \$1,250,244
- Number of partners funded: 11
- Awardees were matched with 1 to 16 school partners
- Services at 61 schools
- 44% of food purchases from local sources
- 3 grantees working directly with farms

Maximizing External Resources

SNAP Outreach Grants: \$201,300 to 5 organizations

- Supports SNAP outreach expansion and enrollment through Community Based Organizations (CBOs)
- Families use benefits for **greater healthy food access** at grocery stores, farmers markets, and other SNAP-eligible retail locations
- State-designated SNAP CBOs leverage dollar for dollar Federal Matching Funds
- Projected \$1.5M+ in new benefits to 1,000+ households and \$2.5M+ invested in local economy

Maryland Market Money: 7 farmers market partners in MoCo with MD Dept of Agriculture

- 6,156 SNAP, WIC & FMNP transactions matched
- \$140,000+ in additional local product purchases

Cold Storage Infrastructure Grants: in partnership with Manna Food Center

- 14 organizations awarded \$352,000 for food recovery & local food distribution
- \$122,568 funded in partnership with the Morningstar Foundation



Retail Partnerships



- \$1.82M investment through Special Appropriation and \$1.8M budgeted in FY25
- The MC Groceries Program aims to help families access fresh and shelf-stable food items.
 Families can place their orders online and have groceries delivered or picked up through a partnership with Instacart Fresh Funds.
- Eligible households may receive \$100 in benefits per month for each child 0-18 years old, up to \$400.
- Created and launched in Summer 2024

Community Food Assistance Grant Program

FY25 Launch:


- Funds the procurement and distribution of shelf-stable, fresh food, and/or prepared meals via direct purchasing and Staples credits, and up to 15% operational costs
- Grantees are active food assistance providers that have provided regularly scheduled monthly services to Montgomery County residents at County sites for at least two years
- Designed to support continuity of existing operations to maintain a solid foundation of support to residents
- Grantees connected to technical assistance and resources for local sourcing, waste audit participation, choice model
- Tiered data collection and reporting requirements tied to award amount

Awards

- \$3,500,000 allocated to 49 organizations in October 2024 for a one year grant period
 - \$100,000 for voucher program partnership with local grocer to increase access to culturally specific groceries




